- Meet Stringent Education,
 Experience and Certification
 Requirements
- Also Known as a Geriatric Care Managers

Who Do Care Managers Work With?


- Those Who Are Without Decision Makers
- Have Families Who Live at a Distance
- Are Overwhelmed by Care Options for Themselves or For a Loved One
- Those With Increased Family Dynamics



Services Are Tailored To Client's & Family's Needs:

- Short-Term Needs
 - Housing and Long Term Care Insurance Advocacy
- Long-Term Needs Including:
 - Advocate for Healthcare, Medical Oversight, Assist
 With Communication on Medical Issues
- Frequency of Services

The Assessment Process Includes:

- Memory & Mental Health
- Social Support Networks
- Financial Resources



Craft a Long-Term Care Plan that Ensures the Estate Plan Matches the Reality of the Client's Situation Both Now and Into the Future.

Recommendations & Resources

After the Assessment

Provide recommendations to vetted resources



- Simplified Options for Decision Making
- Attorneys, Trustees and Guardians rely on Care Managers to determine appropriate levels of care for clients and make recommendations for specific services that meet their clients' needs.

Managing Resistance

 After Appropriate Resources are Identified, Many Families Have Difficulty Getting the Older Adult to Agree to Care.

Aging Life Care Managers Take the Time to Understand

Their Fears and Concerns.

 Help Older Adults Understand That the Use of Care Isn't a Sign of Disability.

• Often Able to Eliminate the Need for a Guardianship.

Family Discord

- Planning for Future and Financial Discussions Often Uncover Existing Family Issues and Discord
- Care Managers Grow to Understand Clients & Their Families as a System or Unit
- Unbiased Advocate Who Assists
 With Important Decisions
- Work With Each Family's Dynamics
- Strong Focus on Relationship Building

Guardianship and Competency

- Assist in Determining the Level of Cognitive Functioning of a Client.
- Trained in the Use of Various Cognitive Assessments That Can Play an Important Part in Determining Incompetency.
- Facilitate the Collection of Relevant Medical Documentation.
- Creating a Plan for Post-Guardianship is Also Part of This Critical Role.
- Act in the Role as a Health Care Advocate for Older Adults Who Have a Guardian.

Exploitation

 Assess for Warning Signs of Vulnerability.



- Knowledgeable About Strategies for Preventing Acts of Exploitation.
- Act as Advocate When Family is Absent.
- If a Family Member Presents the Greatest Threat -Provide an Additional Protective Barrier Between Areas of Risk and Older Adults.

Housing Specialists

- Assist with Planning for Appropriate Level of Housing
- No Referral Fees!
- Plan for Long-Term Picture
 Versus Short-Term



 Base Recommendations on Knowledge & Experience of Area Adult Family Homes, Retirement Communities and Skilled Nursing Facilities

Placement Process

- Perform a Thorough Assessment
- Consider Future Care Needs
- Evaluate Finances and Resources Available
- Evaluate Potential Housing Options
- Set up/Attend Tours
- Negotiate terms of contract, rate, availability
- Plan for Move and Assist With Move as Needed



Healthcare Advocate

Specialize in Managing Care for Those with Chronic Illness, Mental Health or Dementia

- Manage Emergency Room Visits, Hospitalizations & Rehab Stays
- Family Liaison for Those Who Live at a Distance
- 24/7 Emergency Contact for Client
- Attend Doctor Appointments
- Facilitate Communication Between Doctor, Client and the Family
- Coordinate Care Across All Areas: Hospital, Rehab,
 Nursing, Home Health, Home Care

Other Aging Life Care Services

- Healthcare Power of Attorney
- Care Contracts and Care Planning
- Medicaid Planning



- Long Term Care Insurance Claims Advocate
- Care Coordination
- Advocate/Surrogate Family Member
